The Compton Heights Concert Band

Whether it's an antique clock or a stately old house, perhaps you have felt the sense of satisfaction that comes from restoring and breathing life into some relic of a bygone day. That same preservationist philosophy is the driving force behind the Compton Heights Concert Band of St. Louis and our efforts to promote and perform the fine concert band literature of yesteryear.

The band was organized in 1976 by band President, Harry Swanger, who formed the band to provide music for Compton Heights neighborhood events. The band started in his livingroom with just a handful of musicians. Today, the band numbers over 50 volunteer, student and professional musicians who annually present 30 concerts in St. Louis and outstate Missouri.

The band began an eight week summer concert series in 1980 in Tower Grove Park and added a sister series in Francis Park in 1986. These concerts, dubbed *Sunday Serenades* and *Musical Mondays*, attract 50,000 listeners annually. Under the auspices of the Missouri Arts Council Touring Program the band annually tours in outstate Missouri and has been acclaimed by audiences in Hermann, Joplin, Farmington, St. Peters, Cape Girardeau, and Ste. Genevieve.

Featuring John Philip Sousa-style programs, each concert includes outstanding soloists. Some of the nation's most talented musicians have appeared, including Arturo Sandoval, Sukay-music of the Andes, Ricardo Morales, Robert Ellison, William Warfield, Debbye Turner, Buckwheat Zydeco, the Nuclear Whales Saxophone Orchestra, The BNFL British Brass Band, Jan Gippo, Beverly Stewart Anderson, Gail Lennon & the Lennon Brothers, and tenor, Hugh Smith.

Gregory C. Fox was appointed Conductor in September 1992. He finds the audiences "the greatest" and the opportunity to conduct the band "unique". He holds a Doctor of Education in Music Education from the University of Illinois at Champaign-Urbana, studying conducting under the noted Harry Begian. The announcer is Lucy Schroeder, wife of band vice-president and tubist Jon Schroeder. Lucy injects a lively sense of humor and energy into concerts and helps the audience gain a deeper appreciation of the music the band is presenting.

Volunteers in the band contribute over 20,000 hours annually to make our concerts possible. In addition to weekly rehearsals and the busy concert schedule, many band members have devoted thousands of volunteer hours at our Friday and Saturday charity bingos at Bandwagon Hall, 6245 Lemay Ferry Road. The band is also supported by the Regional Arts Commission, St. Louis Parks & Recreation Department, Southwest Bank, Clifford Willard Gaylord Foundation, Whitaker Foundation, Missouri Arts Council, Arts & Education Council, Commerce Bank, and NationsBank. Backstage

Young American tenor **Hugh Smith** made his San Francisco Opera debut in June 1997 as Pinkerton in <u>Madama Butterfly</u>. He has just sung a gala opera concert in Belgrade, as a result of winning the Luciano Pavarotti International Competition. He also recently made his debut in Lisbon's <u>Traviata</u>. Just prior he debuted with the Puerto Rican Symphony in the Beethoven <u>Ninth</u>. Last December saw his St. Louis Symphony debut in a series of holiday concerts followed by a New Year's Eve concert with the Dayton Philharmonic. His Italian debut occurred last spring scoring a triumph as Pinkerton in <u>Madama Butterfly</u> with the Teatro San Carlo, Napoli. He is a winner of the 1995 Luciano Pavarotti International Competition. Other awards granted this young tenor include those from the 1994 Metropolitan Opera National Auditions, the 1994 Mario Lanza Competition, and the 1993 International Friedrich Schorr Competition. He received a Masters Degree in Music from Bowling Green State University in Ohio and currently studies voice with Maestro Bill Schuman.

Hugh Smith has performed with the Opera Company of Philadelphia and the Academy of Vocal Arts and has sung the roles of Riccardo in Verdi's Un Ballo in Maschera, Rodolfo in Puccini's La Boheme, and Lenski in Tchaikovsky's Eugene Onegin. He has also sung as a soloist with the Philadelphia Orchestra. 1996-97 began with Mr. Smith as Dayton's Rodolfo in La Boheme and returns to Dayton for the title role in Faust in 1998. After his Lisbon performances, Mr. Smith had a series of recitals in Florida and a gala concert in Toronto. He then appeared in a gala Verdi and Puccini concert with the Ft. Wayne Symphony followed by the Verdi Requiem for Croatian Radio in Zagreb. Spring 1997 had Hugh back in Philadelphia for a Chekhov trilogy with the Academy of Vocal Arts. He also appeared in Belgrade for a gala opera concert. June, 1997 had Mr. Smith at London's Covent Garden covering Oberto followed by the San Francisco debut. 1997-98 has his debut with the Orchestre de Paris singing the Verdi Requiem under M. Giulini. He also debuts as Cincinnati Opera's Cavaradossi. He returns to Toledo later in 1998 performing his first Don Jose in Carmen - as well as returning to Puerto Rico for the Verdi Requiem. 1998-99 sees his debut with the Opera de Paris, Bastille in the title role of Don Carlo and a debut is scheduled for the teatro comunale Bologna in Attila. A Torino Traviata is also in the offing. His Houston Grand Opera debut is slated for a latter season as Don Carlo. Other roles in preparation include: Edgardo in Lucia and Manrico in Trovatore.



Hugh Smith first appeared with the Compton Heights Concert Band during its "Sunday Serenades" and "Musical Mondays" concert series this past summer. We are privileged to have Hugh Smith grace our stage, once again.

If you haven't heard him until tonight, you'll now know why we have dubbed him "The Fourth Tenor"!

Program Notes

Gaetano Donizetti: L'Elisir d'amore: Una furtiva lagrima (A furtive tear)

The elixir of love is all about the hapless Nemorino and his willingness to do anything to win the love of his adored Adina. The wily Doctor Dulcamara offers a love potion (for a price, of course), and, in desperation, Nemorino enlists in the army to pay for a vial of the potion. Although Adina is anything but enthusiastic (at least outwardly) over Nemorino's attentions, Nemorino finds encouragement in what he perceives to be a furtive tear in her eye, and of course, being an operatic tenor, he feels compelled to sing about it.

Alexandre Borodin: Kismet (1953)

<u>Kismet</u> was adapted by Robert Wright and George Forrest from various themes by Alexandre Borodin. His *Symphony No. 2 in B-minor, Polovtsian Dances*, and *String Quartet in D*, among others, were vital sources. *This is My Beloved* was adapted from Borodin's String Quartet in D.

<u>Kismet</u> is a popular story of a king a beggars who pretends to be a visiting nobleman to the court of the Caliph of ancient Bagdad. Typical productions of this Arabian Nights fantasy fill the stage with coloful sets, costumes and dancing girls. It has been produced as a play and film, and then in a musical version which was filmed in 1955 with Howard Keel.

Charles Gounod: Faust: Salut! demeure chaste et pure (Hail, chaste and pure dwelling)

The legend of Faust cries out for operatic treatment, and Gounod (among others) was delighted to respond, producing one of the most popular and most frequently performed operas. Faust, his youth restored by the machinations of Mephistopheles, is pursuing Marguerite. He finds himself in the garden outside her cottage, and proceeds to serenade the dwelling and the maiden who lives there.

Giacomo Puccini: La Boheme: Che gelida manina (How cold is your little hand)

Rodolfo, a Bohemian poet living in a Paris attic, unexpectedly meets the fragile Mimi as he is about to leave his garret to meet his friends at the Cafe Momus. Love at first sight is an understatement! He grasps her tiny hand, and seizes the opportunity to sing one of the loveliest and most popular arias in all of opera.
