The driving force behind the Compton Heights Concert Band is a preservationist philosophy determined to promote the American Concert Band, the unique American art form created by Patrick Gilmore in the 1860's and perfected by John Philip Sousa at the turn of the last century, and to play the fine concert band literature of yesteryear. As with jazz, another unique American art form, concert bands and concert band literature are undergoing a resurgence in America as we embark on a new millennium. Sousa's concerts were dubbed "the world's greatest pops concerts". In this tradition, a Compton Heights Concert Band concert features programming appealing to all ages and musical tastes; "something for everyone".

From its modest beginning in the Compton Heights neighborhood livingroom of band organizer, President and Executive Director, **Harry F. Swanger**, in 1976, the Band quickly became a metropolitan St. Louis area tradition, attracting over 50,000 listeners annually to its famed dual summer series, **Sunday Serenades** in Francis Park and **Musical Mondays** in Tower Grove Park. The Band performs at annual holiday concerts and metro area events such as the Old Courthouse. Featured artists include: Hugh Smith, tenor; Peter Nero, piano; Arturo Sandoval, jazz/classical trumpet wizard; Sukay, "Music of the Andes"; Alex Klein, Chicago Symphony's principal oboist; James Christensen, former Music Director, Walt Disney World; BNFL Brass Band; Butchwax & The Hollywoods with Johnnie Johnson and Billy Peek; Jerry Robinson & Sax-O-Peel, The Lennon Brothers; the late William Warfield, Baritone; Debbye Turner, marimba; Ricardo Morales, Metropolitan Opera principal clarinet; Myron Floren, accordion; Keith Brion, Sousa portrayer; The Legend Singers; and our own vocal duo of Robert Ellison and Beverly Stewart-Anderson. The Band also tours in Missouri under the auspices of the State Missouri Arts Council.

Edward Dolbashian, Music Director & Conductor, is the orchestra and opera conductor at the University of Missouri, Columbia, the Clayton Symphony, and the Alton Symphony Orchestra, Alton, III. Appointed conductor of the Compton Heights Concert Band in September, 1998, he is also a professional oboe and English Horn player. The announcer is Lucy Schroeder, wife of band vice-president and tubist Jon Schroeder, who is an original member of the Compton Heights Band!

In addition to weekly Band rehearsals, members devote thousands of volunteer hours at its charity bingos at Bandwagon Hall, 6245 Lemay Ferry Road. 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Doc Severinsen, Trumpet

"Heeeeere's Johnny!" That lead-in, followed by a big band trumpet blast, was the landmark of late night television for three decades. The 'Johnny' was Johnny Carson, the announcer was Ed McMahon and the bandleader was Doc Severinsen. Beginning in October 1962, The Tonight Show with Johnny Carson ruled the night air for thirty years. On May 22, 1992, it came to an end...

...And the Beginning of a New Career for Doc Severinsen. Within a week of the final telecast, Doc Severinsen and His Big Band were on the road. Doc's group is composed of The Tonight Show's best musicians -- Ed Shaughnessy on drums, Ernie Watts on tenor sax and Snooky Young on trumpet. Their repertoire includes Ellington and Basie standards, pop, jazz, ballads, big band classics and, of course, The Tonight Show theme. Audiences are finally able to hear the depth of talent belonging to a band that rarely finished a tune on the air. Severinsen can blow the roof off with a trumpet solo, but he is not the only accomplished soloist. Many of his band members get their well-deserved turns in the spotlight. Doc's tours are consistently sold out.

Now Doc Has an Even Newer Crusade... "For many years, I wished that I could build the horn of my dreams. ('If you want something done properly, do it yourself!') Accordingly, I have recently created by own company that produces a once-in-a-lifetime horn-the Destino trumpet by Severinsen Custom Trumpets. The Destino is a dream trumpet, handcrafted one-at-the-time, using old-fash-ioned, craftsman techniques. It is made for trumpet players by trumpet players. The Destino is created in very limited quantities in Germany then sent to me to be road tested on my live concerts until I feel each instrument is something I am proud of and would gladly play for the rest of my life. By the way, I personally go down to the UPS Store and send the Destino off to its new home and personally guarantee its satisfaction!" The gold plated Destino from Severinsen Custom Trumpets is available only from Doc's new website http://www.docseverinsen.com/.

Touring with Doc

When not blessing the Destino, Maestro Severinsen travels the country to perform and conduct with ensembles ranging from symphonic orchestras to jazz bands. In one season alone, Doc travels from Ottawa to Oklahoma City to San Miguel de Allende (Mexico) to San Diego as guest soloist with orchestras, often wearing outfits that are only slightly less brassy than his horn. When not performing with his celebrated group or conducting a major orchestra, he is Principal Pops Conductor of the Minnesota Orchestra, the Milwaukee Symphony Orchestra and the Phoenix Symphony Orchestra. Doc continues to practice three to four hours daily..."just to warm up."

Recordings from Doc

Doc has made more than 30 albums--from big band to jazz-fusion to classical. Two critically acclaimed Telarc CDs with the Cincinnati Pops Orchestra showcase his multifaceted talents from Bach to ballads. His newest CD from Amherst, The Very Best of Doc Severinsen reprises fifteen of Doc's signature pieces. His other recordings include Unforgettably Doc with the Cincinnati Pops on Telarc, and the Grammy nominated Once More With Feeling on Amherst. He received a Grammy Award for "Best Jazz instrumental Performance - Big Band" for his recording of Doc Severinsen and The Tonight Show Band-Volume I. Doc Severinsen and His Big Band/Swingin' the Blues is his latest release with Ed Shaughnessy and Ernie Watts.

Background

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Severinsen's accomplishments began in his hometown of Arlington, Oregon, population: 600. Carl H Severinsen was born on July 7th, 1927, and was nick-named "Little Doc" after his father, Dr. Carl Severinsen a dentist. Little Doc had originally wanted to play the trombone. But the senior Severinsen, a gifted amateur violinist, urged him to study the violin. The younger Severinsen insisted on the trombone, but had to settle for the only horn available in Arlington's small music store -- a trumpet. A week later, with the help of his father and a manual of instructions, the seven-year-old was so good that he was invited to join the high school band. At the age of twelve, Little Doc won the Music Educator's National Contest and, while still in high school, was hired to go on the road with the famous Ted Fio Rito Orchestra.

However, his stay with the group was cut short by the draft. He served in the Army during World War II and following his discharge, landed a spot with the Charlie Barnet Band. When this band broke up, Severinsen toured with the Tommy Dorsey, then, the Benny Goodman, bands in the late 40's.

After his days with Barnet and Dorsey, Doc arrived in New York City in 1949 to become a staff musician for NBC. After years of playing with the peacock network's studio bands, Severinsen was invited to do a gig with the highly respected Tonight Show Band. An impressed conductor, Skitch Henderson, asked him to join that band in 1962 as first trumpet. Five years later, Doc took over as Music Director for The Tonight Show and stayed with the show until Johnny Carson retired from late night television in 1992.

Today, Doc has not lost his flair for outrageous fashions and witty banter. Yet, he is highly regarded as one of the most technically proficient trumpeters. Doc has the best stage presence of anyone out there. He can blow a horn like few others...he is a high note virtuoso, a genuinely funny man, and always a fashion fiend.

Somewhere along Doc's journey from Oregon, to New York, to this evening's concert, the "Little" was lost, but he remains ageless. Doc Severinsen continues to be a favorite of audiences across America.

Edward Dolbashian, Conductor

Edward Dolbashian has been Music Director of the Missouri University Philharmonic in Columbia, Missouri, since 1984; Music Director of the Alton Symphony Orchestra, in Alton, Illinois, since 1993; and the Compton Heights Concert Band since September 1998. He is also the conductor of the Clavton Symphony.

Mr. Dolbashian began his musical training as a student at New York's famed High School of the Performing Arts. He earned his degrees in oboe performance at the Hartt College of Music, Hartford, CT. His conducting career began as director of the Holyoke Symphony Orchestra in Holyoke, MA. He studied conducting at the prestigious Pierre Monteaux School of Orchestra Conducting in Maine, under Charles Bruck; and at Yale University as student conducting assistant to Otto Werner-Mueller leading to a Master of Musical Arts degree in Orchestral Conducting. studies took place at the Tanglewood Institute, with Leonard Bernstein, Seiji Ozawa, Andre Previn, and Gustav Meier, and the Boris Goldovsky Opera Conducting Seminar. Mr. Dolbashian was a member of the Hartford Symphony for 11 years and was principal oboe of the Hartford Chamber Orchestra, the Goldovsky Opera Company, and the Hudson Valley Philharmonic. He debuted as oboe soloist in Town Hall, NY, NY, 1969.

Hugh Smith, Tenor

Hugh Smith made his professional debut in Madama Butterfly at the Teatro San Carlo and has since appeared in leading tenor roles throughout the world, including at the Lyric Opera of Chicago, l'Opera National de Paris. Opera de Paris, Berlin Deutsche Oper, San

Francisco Opera, Netherlands Opera, Hamburgische Oper, Sahr Opera Pacific, San Diego Opera, Opera de Puerto Rico, Lithuanian Opera, Opera North, Spoleto USA, Michigan Opera Theatre, Baltimore Opera, Dayton Opera, and Edinburgh Festival, Metropolitan Opera in the Parks, Richard Tucker Gala and at the Kennedy Center Awards in honor of Luciano Pavarotti.



He holds a Masters in Music from Bowling Green State U., Ohio and continued his studies at the Academy of Vocal Arts, Philadelphia.

He won the following prestigious international awards: International Friedrich Schorr Competition, Metropolitan Opera National Auditions, Mario Lanza Competition, Placido Domingo Fellowship Award, Sullivan Foundation Award, and the 1995 Luciano Pavarotti International Competition.

In March 2004, Hugh performed Messa Da Requiem by Giuseppe Verdi at the Deutsche Oper Berlin. He previously appeared as Gustaf III., König von Schweden in Un Ballo in Maschera by Giuseppe Verdi at the Deutsche Oper Berlin. He soloed in Mahler's Symphony No. 8 "Symphony of a Thousand" at the Alfredo Kraus Auditorium, Las Palmas de Gran Canaria. He returned to the Canary Islands for Dvorák's Stabat Mater with the Orquesta Filarmónica de G. Canaria in May. This summer, Hugh debuted at the National New Theater, Tokyo, Japan, as Don José in Carmen, before returning to St. Louis to appear with the Concertgebouw, under Maestro Edo de Waart; and toured with Opera North in their production of Manon Lescaut. A group of 17 people from St. Louis traveled to England to see Hugh in Manon Lescaut. The group tours are organized by Band President & Executive Director Harry Swanger, and his wife, Kitty.
