

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### Band History

The Compton Heights Concert Band of St. Louis was organized in 1976. Initially, the Band performed at Compton Heights Neighborhood events. The Band's membership numbered 18 at its first performance. By 1977 the Band made its first major public appearance in the Tower Grove Park Concert Series in the Henry Shaw Memorial Bandstand. Presently, the Band consists of over sixty amateur, student and professional musicians from the St. Louis metropolitan area. The Band includes in its membership lawyers, doctors, teachers, and many other occupations.

Malcolm McDuffee was appointed Assistant Band Director in September, 1986. He was named Band Director in January, 1988. Holder of a B.S. in Music Education, Ithaca College, 1963 and a Master in Music Performance, Indiana University, 1968, he has enjoyed a long professional career including the Assistant Principal Trumpet position with the St. Louis Symphony, 1973-1987. He is presently on the Washington University and U.M.S.L. Music Faculties.

The Band's original Director was Kaid Friedel, a founder of the Band and member of the St. Louis Symphony horn section. Mr. Friedel brought to the Band a long professional conducting career including the Alton Civic orchestra, Kansas City American Legion Band and Kansas City Youth Symphony.

This past summer the Band presented its eighth "MUSICAL MONDAYS" (originally "TUNE-FULL TUESDAYS") series which at eight concerts attracted more than 20,000 listeners to the Henry Shaw Memorial Bandstand in Tower Grove Park. In 1981 the Band and the "TUNE-FULL TUESDAYS" series were honored by a City of St. Louis proclamation. Last summer the Band repeated its "SUNDAY SERENADES" Series on Sunday nights in Francis Park and Union Station. Both Series will be repeated this summer for the third consecutive year with all "SUNDAY SERENADES" concerts in Francis Park.

The Band has been recognized by the Selmer Band Instrument Company, Elkhart, Indiana, as a model for community concert bands throughout the nation. Many of the Band's ideas were incorporated by Selmer in a nationally distributed publication for community bands. The Compton Heights Concert Band recently was honored as the Host for the National Convention of the Association of Concert Bands. Missouri House and Senate Resolutions marked this occasion and the Band's accomplishments since its inception.

To finance the many expenses connected with its operations, the Band depends on individual donations, concert sponsors' fees, corporate donations, a weekly Bingo, sales of Band T-shirts, hats, buttons, books, subscriptions to the Old House Journal, grants from the Regional Arts Commission, the Missouri Arts Council, the Monsanto Fund, the Pitzman Fund and BANDWAGON memberships.

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

### Program Notes

#### A Summer Day in Compton Heights Park

by Robert Wykes

When Harry Swanger and I first talked about what I might compose for the Compton Heights Concert Band, some seven months ago, it flashed across my mind that a piece in the form of a medley would lend itself nicely to my good feelings about bands. These good feelings date from my childhood when the focus of my musical activity was playing the flute and piccolo in the school and community bands of Aliquippa, Pennsylvania. Our bands played many symphonic works—Wagner overtures, for instance,—but it was medleys that filled in the programs in summer concerts. The shape of these medleys, a string of well known tunes, fascinated me. Broadway show tunes, popular dance music of the day and the songs of Stephen Collins Foster are some of the ones I recall.

A Summer Day is like a medley, a string of tunes, but it differs from those I recall in that all the tunes are original (except for the ghostly echoes heard during First Light). It suggests the events of an imaginary day in a community park; the beginning of the day is quiet and still (First Light); birds sing; after sun-up people arrive to play and/or picnic; a band arrives, tunes-up and gives a concert; the stillness and quiet of twilight ends the day. (NOTE: at this performance the Twilight section will be omitted) Not only do I recall that this shape and sequence of events belonged to many days in my youth, but also as a adult I have experienced the same events and feelings while walking in the parks of London, Hyde and Regents, and our own Forest and Tower Grove. A Summer Day in Compton Heights Park intends to evoke the shape of an imaginary day in an imaginary park. It is a medley-fantasy commissioned by, written for and dedicated to the people of the Compton Heights Concert Band. Harry Swanger, President; Malcolm McDuffee, Director. It was funded in part by a grant from the state Missouri Arts Council, Creative Artists Project.

Dr. Wykes has been a resident of St. Louis and a Professor at Washington University since 1955. His music has been performed by the Denver Symphony, the Philadelphia Orchestra, the Minnesota Orchestra, the National Orchestra of Brazil, the Pro Arte Orchestra and the St. Louis Symphony. He has written film music for Robert Kennedy Remembered (1968 Academy Award,) and Monument to the Dream, the building of the Gateway Arch.
