



The driving force behind the Compton Heights Concert Band is a preservationist philosophy determined to promote the American Concert Band, the unique American art form created by Patrick Gilmore in the 1860's and perfected by John Philip Sousa at the turn of the last century, and to play the fine concert band literature of yesteryear. As with jazz, another unique American art form, concert bands and concert band literature are undergoing a resurgence in America as we approach the new millenium. Sousa's concerts were dubbed "the world's greatest pops concerts". In this tradition, a Compton Heights Concert Band concert features programming appealing to all ages and musical tastes; "something for everyone".

From its modest beginning in the Compton Heights neighborhood livingroom of band organizer, President and Executive Director, Harry Swanger, in 1976, the Band quickly became a metropolitan St. Louis area tradition, attracting over 50,000 listeners annually to its famed dual summer series, *Sunday Serenades* in Francis Park and *Musical Mondays* in Tower Grove Park. This year marks the 20th anniversary of these concerts, featuring Sousa-style programs with world class guest artists. Headliners such as Hugh Smith, "the 4th tenor"; Arturo Sandoval, jazz/classical trumpet wizard; the extraordinary Sukay, "Music of the Andes"; Alex Klein, Chicago Symphony's principal oboist; and our own vocal duo of Robert Ellison and Beverly Stewart-Anderson are all featured in the 1999 season.

Edward Dolbashian, conductor, is the orchestra and opera conductor at the University of Missouri, Columbia and conducts the Alton Symphony Orchestra, Alton, III. Appointed conductor of the Compton Heights Concert Band in September, 1998, he is also an accomplished oboe and English Horn player.

The announcer is Lucy Schroeder, wife of band vice-president and tubist Jon Schroeder. Lucy injects a lively sense of humor and aids the audience appreciation of the music.

The Compton Heights Band Chorus was organized in 1999. Consisting of approximately forty former members of the Anheuser-Busch Chorus under the direction of Mark Marting, Choral Director at the St. Louis Priory School, the Compton Heights Band Chorus will maintain a busy year-round schedule of rehearsals and concerts and appearances with the Band.

In addition to weekly Band and Chorus rehearsals, band members devote thousands of volunteer hours at our Friday and Saturday night charity bingos at the Band operated bingo complex, Bandwagon Hall, 6245 Lemay Ferry Road, 845-1877. The Band is also supported by the Regional Arts Commission, St. Louis Parks & Recreation Department, Southwest Bank, Whitaker Foundation, Clifford Willard Gaylord Foundation, Arts & Education Council and Commerce Bank.

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Edward Dolbashian was appointed conductor of the Compton

Heights Concert Band in September 1998. He is also Music Director of the Missouri University Philharmonic in Columbia, Missouri, a post he has held since 1984, and Music Director of the Alton Symphony Orchestra, in Alton, Illinois, to which he was appointed in 1993.

Edward began his musical training as a student at New York's famed High School of the Performing Arts. Upon graduation, Mr. Dolbashian entered the Hartt College of Music, in Hartford Connecticut, where he earned his degrees in oboe performance.

Edward's conducting career began when he accepted the directorship of the Holyoke Symphony Orchestra in Holyoke, Massachusetts. His orchestral conducting studies took him to the prestigious Pierre Monteaux School of Orchestra Conducting in Maine, studying under Charles Bruck; and to Yale University, where he served as student conducting assistant to Otto Werner-Mueller en route to earning a Master of Musical Arts degree in Orchestral Conducting. Further studies took place at the Tanglewood Institute, with Leonard Bernstein, Seiji Ozawa, Andre

Previn, and Gustav Meier, and the Boris Goldovsky Opera Conducting Seminar.

Before coming to Missouri, he was a member of the Hartford Symphony for 11 years and was principal oboe of the Hartford Chamber Orchestra, the Goldovsky Opera Company, and the Hudson Valley Philharmonic. He made his solo oboe debut in Town Hall, NY, NY, 1969. Edward also maintains an active guest conducting schedule. Most recently he appeared as guest conductor of the "1998 International Festival of Music Orchestra" in Belem, Brazil, and as guest conductor of the Londrina Symphony in Londrina, Brazil.

Hugh Smith is a young American tenor whose career has been on a meteoric rise since he won the following:

Hugh is from Lebanon, Ohio. He holds a Masters in Music from Bowling Green State U., Ohio, and a Masters in Fine Arts from the Academy of Vocal Arts, Philadelphia, PA.

Hugh has appeared with major symphony orchestras and opera companies all over the world. His opera experience is already vast and includes outstanding appearances such as:

St. Louis Connection

In December 1996, Hugh Smith first appeared in St. Louis with the St. Louis Symphony in their Holiday Pops Concerts series. Unheralded, Smith overwhelmed the St. Louis audiences who attended those performances. Later, attendees invariably recalled the collective experience of jaws dropping as the audience experienced the first phrases of the Serenade from the Student Prince and spontaneously rising together in a standing ovation for this remarkable young singer. Standing ovation after standing ovation followed each number he sang. At another performance during that series, an audience member said that after Hugh sang one selection, there was a long silence before anyone applauded. Everyone was stunned because it was so beautiful.

Thousands of listeners joined the ranks of these "fans" after attending outdoor public band concerts presented by the Compton Heights Concert Band of St. Louis where Hugh appeared as guest artist. Hugh was clearly the sensation of the band's 1997 and 1998 popular summer concert series Sunday Serenades and Musical Mondays drawing thousands to Francis Park and Tower Grove Park. Again, Hugh overwhelmed the audiences, many of whom had never heard anyone perform so poignantly. The audience experienced a performance where they wept during *Danny Boy*, cheered for *Nessun Dorma* and loved everything else in between. After a full program, Hugh sang two encores to these record crowds of over 5,000 who were clamoring for more!

As a result of those appearances, a group of over 20 fans traveled to Paris in October, 1998 for Hugh's Opera de Paris debut in the title role of Verdi's *Don Carlo*. They had a marvelous time and enjoyed seeing Hugh perform magnificently in the role. In November, 1999, the Compton Heights Band is planning a group tour to Amsterdam to see Hugh as Cavaradossi in Puccini's Tosca. You can join in the fun! Sign up on the last page of the program.

Hugh continued to win the hearts of St. Louis residents when he returned for the Compton Heights Concert Band's Holiday Pops Concert held in Powell Symphony Hall in December 1998. 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
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
