The driving force behind the Compton Heights Concert Band is a preservationist philosophy determined to promote the American Concert Band, the unique American art form created by Patrick Gilmore in the 1860's and perfected by John Philip Sousa at the turn of the last century, and to play the fine concert band literature of yesteryear. As with jazz, another unique American art form, concert bands and concert band literature are undergoing a resurgence in America. Sousa's concerts were dubbed "the world's greatest pops concerts". In this tradition, a Compton Heights Concert Band concert features programming appealing to all ages and musical tastes; "something for everyone".

From its modest beginning in the Compton Heights neighborhood living room of band organizer, President and Executive Director, **Harry F. Swanger**, in 1976, the Band quickly became a metropolitan St. Louis area tradition, attracting over 50,000 listeners annually to its famed summer series, Sunday Serenades in Francis Park and the tandem series Musical Mondays in Tower Grove Park. Last year marked the 9th Annual highly successful Compton Heights Band Holiday Pops at Powell Hall. Performances in the past have included headliners such as Peter Nero, piano; Doc Severinsen, trumpet; and the perennial summer and Powell Hall crowd favorite, Hugh Smith, tenor. Other featured artists include: BBC Cardiff 2005 Singer of the World, Nicole Cabell; Arturo Sandoval, jazz/classical trumpet wizard; Sigrun Hjalmtysdottir, "Diddú", Soprano, David Morris, International Whistling Champion, Buckwheat Zydeko, Sukay, "Music of the Andes"; Alex Klein, Oboe; James Christensen, Walt Disney World; BNFL Brass Band; Butch Wax & The Hollywoods with Billy Peek; the late Johnnie Johnson; Jerry Robinson & Sax-O-Peel, The Lennon Brothers; the late William Warfield, Baritone; Debbye Turner, marimba; Ricardo Morales, Metropolitan Opera principal clarinet; the late Myron Floren, accordion; Keith Brion, Sousa portrayer; The Legend Singers; Robert Ellison, baritone; and Beverly Stewart-Anderson, soprano.

Edward Dolbashian, Music Director & Conductor, is the orchestra and opera conductor at the University of Missouri, Columbia, the Clayton Symphony, and the Alton Symphony Orchestra. He was appointed conductor of the Compton Heights Concert Band in September, 1998. He is a professional oboist and an English Horn player, originally from New York. **Lucy Schroeder**, announcer, is the wife of band vice-president and tubist **Jon Schroeder**, an original member of the Compton Heights Band!

In addition to weekly Band rehearsals, members devote thousands of volunteer hours at bingo at Bandwagon Hall on Friday and Saturday nights throughout the year. The Band is also financially supported by the Adam's Mark Hotel, Clifford Willard Gaylord Foundation, Foot and Ankle Associates, Missouri Arts Council, Regional Arts Commission, Southwest Bank, St. Louis Parks & Recreation Department, Tower Grove Manor, and Bandwagon Members.

We had to vacate our old band office and rehearsal room, our home for over 20 years, and move both to our new home at 3120 Lafayette Avenue, St. Louis, MO 63104, the former Immaculate Conception/St. Henry Catholic Church and Rectory, just one block East of Compton and easily reachable by I-44 taking the Grand Blvd exit in either direction.

We are buying the historic Immaculate Conception complex which will provide us with a terrific rehearsal and concert facility for performing arts groups, as well as the location of our office headquarters.

Stay tuned for information on future activities at our concert hall, as well as a Capital Campaign to be announced soon to fund, renovate, and endow this wonderful, magnificent, historic complex!

Support SousaMania 2007! A Special Message from the President.

An often asked question this summer by you, our faithful fans, has been "how are you doing?" This is a perplexing question to answer. On one had we have so many seemingly exciting projects in progress such as our renovation of the new headquarters and concert hall (former Immaculate Conception church), renovation of a former DeBasio Furniture Store for a state of the art bingo facility (best and biggest in Missouri), and the infusion of many new, young players; winners of the 1st annual College Scholarship program, to name a few.

On the other hand, unavoidable expenses, such as replacement of aging equipment, crop up along with the expenses of growing and solidifying our organization *vis a vis* our new concert hall/headquarters and the new charity bingo facility.

For example, in the first two weeks of our season, we have had to spend upwards of \$20,000 for sorely needed platforms, audio equipment, chairs, lighting, instruments, and other equipment for our rehearsal and concert stages. In addition to improve our bingo fundraising with the pending new facility, tens of thousands of dollars had to be spent in the short run on plans, permits, and early renovation. Extensive additional renovations and substantial long term financing will be necessary. Unlike the members of the Zoo-Museum District, we receive no large tax subsidies. Consequently, the Bandwagon memberships are not "extra" but "essential" funds for operating and supporting our growth considering the free Sunday Serenades and Musical Mondays series costs over \$300,000 to produce each year. Madeline Edwards Backstage Bio



Madeline Edwards is a twelve year old rising seventh grader at Eastern Wayne Middle School in Goldsboro, North Carolina. Madeline has been singing since she was a young child and has always preferred singing classical music.

Her first organized musical experience was when she was eighteen months old in Kindermusik classes. At the same age, she was mesmerized by watching musicals, particularly *The Sound of Music*. She also enjoyed Charlotte Church CDs, and by listening to these she taught herself many of the songs including different languages.

Realizing Madeline's talent early on, her family exposed her to a variety of musical genres and experiences. She loves musical theatre and concerts. In fact, when she was five years old she saw Charlotte Church perform in Atlanta, Georgia. Until the age of eight, Madeline was self-taught. After that time she studied with John Kramar, Professor of Opera at East Carolina University in Greenville. Professor Kramar indicated that she was a musical prodigy. For the past two years she has traveled to Raleigh, North Caroline for weekly voice lessons with Elaine Baker.

Fortunately, in her hometown of Goldsboro there is a very active theatre group for children. StageStruck, The Young People's Own Theatre has offered her the opportunity to perform *South Pacific, Peter Pan, Sound of Music,* and *Bye, Bye Birdie*. Madeline also had the opportunity to attend an auditioned summer program, Kids on Broadway, offered by the North Carolina Theatre. At this very intensive, highly competitive camp Madeline was awarded the Bruce Hubbard Vocal Scholarship.

Madeline's sixth grade year was an exciting one. Having won the national contest, Living Room Live...Kid's Edition, Madeline performed live on the CBS Early Show. Shortly after her return from New York City, she was invited to sing in *La Boheme* with the North Carolina Opera. She also sang a solo with the orchestra prior to the opera. Singing with an orchestra for the first time and getting a standing ovation were thrilling experiences for Madeline.

In April 2007, Madeline performed at the American Diabetes Association's Hope Gala. She will sing at the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation Walk-A-Thon and an Alzheimer's Walk in October. Her performances include numerous church, civic and sports events. At age four, Madeline was diagnosed with juvenile diabetes. She decided to use her musical talent to help find a cure for her and the many other children who deal with diabetes. She made her own CD which included five songs in five languages. Profits from the sale of the CD were donated to the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation. Her contribution totaled approximately \$6,000. At the time of the recording she was seven years old.

Madeline's creativity extends beyond her vocal ability. She is gifted in art and creative written expression. She takes piano, jazz and ballet to round out her love of the arts.

Madeline's family consists of her parents, Michael and Kelli, her younger sister Mary Lindsey, Macie the golden retriever, and Gretl and Zoey, the cats. Madeline and Mary Lindsey enjoy playing piano duets and participating in plays together.

Just as Madeline's gifts are many, so are her dreams. After attending an opera at the Metropolitan Opera while in New York City, she dreams of performing on that stage. And close by is Julliard, which would be yet another dream to be able to study there. Above all, she dreams that there will be a cure found for diabetes.

This is Madeline Edwards' first appearance with the Compton Heights Concert Band. Welcome!

Edward Dolbashian has been Music Director of the Missouri University Philharmonic in Columbia, Missouri, since 1984; Music Director of the Alton Symphony Orchestra, in Alton, Illinois, since 1993; and the Compton Heights Concert Band since September 1998. He is also the conductor of the Clayton Symphony.

Mr. Dolbashian began his musical training as a student at New York's famed High School of the Performing Arts. He earned his degrees in oboe performance at the Hartt College of Music, Hartford, CT.

His conducting career began as director of the Holyoke Symphony Orchestra in Holyoke, MA. He studied conducting at the prestigious Pierre Monteaux School of Orchestra Conducting in Maine, under Charles Bruck;

and at Yale University as student conducting assistant to Otto Werner-Mueller leading to a Master of Musical Arts degree in Orchestral Conducting. Further studies took place at the Tanglewood Institute, with Leonard Bernstein, Seiji Ozawa, Andre Previn, and Gustav Meier, and the Boris Goldovsky Opera Conducting Seminar.

Mr. Dolbashian was a member of the Hartford Symphony for 11 years and was principal oboe of the Hartford Chamber Orchestra, the Goldovsky Opera Company, and the Hudson Valley Philharmonic. He debuted as oboe soloist in Town Hall, NY, NY, 1969.




