

The driving force behind the Compton Heights Concert Band is a preservationist philosophy determined to promote the American Concert Band, the unique American art form created by Patrick Gilmore in the 1860's and perfected by John Philip Sousa at the turn of the last century, and to play the fine concert band literature of yesteryear. As with jazz, another unique American art form, concert bands and concert band literature are undergoing a resurgence in America as we embark on a new millennium. Sousa's concerts were dubbed "the world's greatest pops concerts". In this tradition, a Compton Heights Concert Band concert features programming appealing to all ages and musical tastes; "something for everyone".

From its modest beginning in the Compton Heights neighborhood livingroom of band organizer, President and Executive Director, Harry F. Swanger, in 1976, the Band guickly became a metropolitan St. Louis area tradition, attracting over 50,000 listeners annually to its famed dual summer series, Sunday Serenades in Francis Park and Musical Mondays in Tower Grove Park. In addition, last summer the Band presented Sousa Saturdays, a three part series, in Laumeier Sculpture Park. The Band performs at annual holiday concerts and metro area events such as the Old Courthouse. Featured artists include: Hugh Smith, tenor; Arturo Sandoval, jazz/classical trumpet wizard; Sukay, "Music of the Andes"; Alex Klein, Chicago Symphony's principal oboist; James Christensen, former Music Director, Walt Disney World; BNFL Brass Band; Jerry Robinson & Sax-O-Peel, The Lennon Brothers; the late William Warfield, Baritone; Debbye Turner, marimba; Ricardo Morales, Metropolitan Opera principal clarinet; Nuclear Whales Saxophone Orchestra; Myron Floren, accordion; Jean Kittrell & The St. Louis Rivermen, Keith Brion, Sousa portrayer; The Legend Singers; The St. Louis Hills Chorus; and our own vocal duo of Robert Ellison and Beverly Stewart-Anderson. The Band also tours in Missouri under the auspices of the State Missouri Arts Council. A tour to Joplin in June 2003 marks the 3rd appearance of the Compton Heights Band in the Joplin Pops series.

Edward Dolbashian, Music Director & Conductor, is the orchestra and opera conductor at the University of Missouri, Columbia, the Clayton Symphony, and the Alton Symphony Orchestra, Alton, III. Appointed conductor of the Compton Heights Concert Band in September, 1998, he is also a professional oboe and English Horn player. The announcer is Lucy Schroeder, wife of band vice-president and tubist Jon Schroeder, who is an original member of the Compton Heights Band! Lucy injects a lively sense of humor and aids the audience appreciation of the music.

In addition to weekly Band rehearsals, members devote thousands of volunteer hours at its charity bingos at Bandwagon Hall, 6245 Lemay Ferry Road. 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This summer we had the unique experience of having **Billyo O'Donnell** attend our concerts and create paintings as the Band performed. Billyo is a nationally acclaimed American artist who still lives in his native state of Missouri near St. Louis. His resume on the next page speaks to the extraordinary genius of this gifted artist.

We are indeed fortunate that he has captured some of the highlights of an exceptional *Sunday Serenades & Musical Mondays* season by the Compton Heights Concert Band on his canvases. His presence at the concerts inspired many long time listeners to express to him their very strong, personal feelings and joy in attending these concerts. This interaction between painter, audience, and performer is an experience we will never forget! *The following biographical information is from BillyoArt.com.*

Billyo thrives on his passion for creating paintings en plein air (in open air) that mark the exact point in time at which his inspiration happens. He thinks of his paintings as a diary of his artwork telling a story of himself at that moment. When he paints, it reminds him of how he must react spontaneously to inspiration in life or chance losing that significant experience. And, it is his easy nature in his style of living, synchronizing with the ease he feels when creating his works of art, that make those moments unique.

When asked about the greatest pleasure in his profession, Billyo answered, "It's the experience of painting outside. The snow, strong wind, cold, muggy heat, mosquitoes, they all remind me of life and how we must stay focused and keep pushing on. As I think about masses, color, relationships, the harmony of the piece, value, strokes and textures and combine them with the energy of the land and the environment around me, it transcends the quality of staying focused and persevering in life."

Perseverance and nature have always been a part of Billyo's life. His perseverance has led him to become one of the top plein air painters in the country leaving his mark and personality on each work he creates. Perhaps the natural part of him began in his early days when he grew up west of St. Louis in an area where the prairie transforms into hills as it approaches the Missouri River. He explored the country then, as a child, making the connection with nature that has continued on to today and into his land-scape paintings.



Carolinn Skyler plays the world's largest armonica, five feet long, manufactured by the legendary Gerhard Finkenbeiner. Benjamin Franklin invented this extraordinary instrument in 1761. Skyler's quartz armonica, in the style of Benjamin Franklin's original instrument, consists of 61 hand-blown crystal bowls of different diameters, each corresponding to different notes forming five scales plus one note. The bowls are fitted one into another on a horizontal rod



which rotates them. Skyler touches the turning edges with wet fingers producing eerie, beautiful tones and chords.

In the late 1700's the glass armonica was considered the fashionable accessory of parlors and sitting-rooms. It was so popular that a year later, just before his death, Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart composed two glass-armonica pieces for his distant cousin, the blind glass armonica performer, Marianne Kirchgessner.

But, by the mid-1800s, rumors circulated of ghosts and a variety of evils: domestic squabbles, nervous disorders, premature deaths, even fatal disorders all attributed to the playing of the glass armonica. Eventually, banned around the world, it became extinct. Scientists now blame lead poisoning. In the mid 18th Century, glass contained a significant amount of lead - lead that could have been absorbed through musicians' fingers.

Adding to the mystique of the glass armonica was the recent mysterious disappearance of the master glass craftsman, Gerhard Finkenbeiner. His private plane crashed in Massachusetts after taking off from his Waltham glass factory. Nary a trace of Gerhard was found. As a result, his sons and staff have taken over the business and continue to manufacture about 8 to 10 glass armonicas each year, ranging in price from \$6,000 to \$36,000 depending on the size of the instrument. It takes 50 to 60 hours to produce one glass armonica.

Today, the instrument is made with quartz, the purest of glass, a crystal that new agers believe possesses healing energy. And it has transformed the armonica's reputation. Its ethereal, spooky sounds now float through film scores and classical compositions. Linda Ronstadt is producing a record about the history of glass music.

Ms. Skyler will introduce her "glass act" on this rare instrument with a varied Americana program she performs daily in Philadelphia at Carpenter's Hall, the real place of the signing of the Declaration of Independence. In this presentation, wearing period clothing, she portrays Mozart's cousin, Marianne Kirchgessner.

She is, indeed, in a "glass" by herself!

Edward Dolbashian has held the posts of Music Director of the Missouri University Philharmonic in Columbia, Missouri, since 1984; Music Director of the Alton Symphony Orchestra, in Alton, Illinois, since 1993; and the Compton Heights Concert Band since September 1998. He is also the conductor of the Clayton Symphony.

Mr. Dolbashian began his musical training as a student at New York's famed High School of the Performing Arts. He earned his degrees in oboe performance at the Hartt College of Music, Hartford, CT. His conducting career began as director of the Holyoke Symphony Orchestra in Holyoke, MA. He studied conducting at the prestigious Pierre Monteaux School of Orchestra Conducting in Maine, under Charles Bruck; and at Yale

University as student conducting assistant to Otto Werner-Mueller leading to a Master of Musical Arts degree in Orchestral Conducting. Further studies took place at the Tanglewood Institute, with Leonard Bernstein, Seiji Ozawa, Andre Previn, and Gustav Meier, and the Boris Goldovsky Opera Conducting Seminar. Mr. Dolbashian was a member of the Hartford Symphony for 11 years and was principal oboe of the Hartford Chamber Orchestra, the Goldovsky Opera Company, and the Hudson Valley Philharmonic. He debuted as oboe soloist in Town Hall, NY, NY, 1969.

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


