The driving force behind the Compton Heights Concert Band is a preservationist philosophy determined to promote the American Concert Band, the unique American art form created by Patrick Gilmore in the 1860's and perfected by John Philip Sousa at the turn of the last century, and to play the fine concert band literature of yesteryear. As with jazz, another unique American art form, concert bands and concert band literature are undergoing a resurgence in America as we embark on a new millennium. Sousa's concerts were dubbed "the world's greatest pops concerts". In this tradition, a Compton Heights Concert Band concert features programming appealing to all ages and musical tastes; "something for everyone".

From its modest beginning in the Compton Heights neighborhood livingroom of band organizer, President and Executive Director, Harry F. Swanger, in 1976, the Band quickly became a metropolitan St. Louis area tradition, attracting over 50,000 listeners annually to its famed dual summer series, Sunday Serenades in Francis Park and Musical Mondays in Tower Grove Park. The Band performs at annual holiday concerts and metro area events such as the Old Courthouse. Featured artists include: Hugh Smith, tenor; Peter Nero, piano; Arturo Sandoval, jazz/classical trumpet wizard; Sukay, "Music of the Andes": Alex Klein, Chicago Symphony's principal oboist; James Christensen, former Music Director, Walt Disney World; BNFL Brass Band; Butchwax & The Hollywoods with Johnnie Johnson and Billy Peek; Jerry Robinson & Sax-O-Peel, The Lennon Brothers; the late William Warfield, Baritone; Debbye Turner, marimba; Ricardo Morales, Metropolitan Opera principal clarinet; Myron Floren, accordion; Keith Brion, Sousa portraver; The Legend Singers; and our own vocal duo of Robert Ellison and Beverly Stewart-Anderson. The Band also tours in Missouri under the auspices of the State Missouri Arts Council.

Edward Dolbashian, Music Director & Conductor, is the orchestra and opera conductor at the University of Missouri, Columbia, the Clayton Symphony, and the Alton Symphony Orchestra, Alton, III. Appointed conductor of the Compton Heights Concert Band in September, 1998, he is also a professional oboe and English Horn player. The announcer is Lucy Schroeder, wife of band vice-president and tubist Jon Schroeder, who is an original member of the Compton Heights Band!

In addition to weekly Band rehearsals, members devote thousands of volunteer hours at its charity bingos at Bandwagon Hall, 6245 Lemay Ferry Road. ## Edward Dolbashian, Conductor

Edward Dolbashian has been Music Director of the Missouri University Philharmonic in Columbia, Missouri, since 1984; Music Director of the Alton Symphony Orchestra, in Alton, Illinois, since 1993; and the Compton Heights Concert Band since September 1998. He is also the conductor of the Clayton Symphony.

Mr. Dolbashian began his musical training as a student at New York's famed High School of the Performing Arts. He earned his degrees in oboe performance at the Hartt College of Music, Hartford, CT. His conducting career began as director of the Holyoke Symphony Orchestra in Holyoke, MA. He studied conducting at the prestigious Pierre Monteaux School of Orchestra Conducting in Maine, under Charles Bruck; and at Yale University as student conducting assistant to Otto Werner-Mueller leading to

## Stephen K. Charpie

Stephen K. Charpie, resides in Los Angeles, California. He was originally from Hickman Mills, Missouri. He received his formal education at The Manhattan School of Music in New York City where he received the Artist's Diploma and degrees in trumpet performance at The Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C. His principal teachers were Mr. Mel Broiles of the Metropolitan Opera Orchestra, and Mr. Adel Sanchez of the National Symphony Orchestra.



Mr. Charpie was a member of The U.S. Navy Band in Washington, D.C., serving as first trumpet and as an occasional soloist. Additionally, Steve has been a member of Walt Disney

World Band (Orlando, Florida), Disneyland Band (Anaheim, California), Mr. Jack Daniel's Original Silver Cornet Band, The New Sousa Band with Keith Brion, and the New Columbian Band. Steve is a long-time member of The Long Beach Symphony Orchestra, and performs regularly with The Louisville (KY) Orchestra. He is principal trumpet with The Mozart Chamber Orchestra and was featured soloist with the ensemble last March. He is regularly principal trumpet with the Capistrano Valley Symphony. He is an extra with The Pacific Symphony, The New York City Opera, The American Ballet Theatre Orchestra, and The Brooklyn Symphony. He records for television, films and jingles, and recorded much of the music for Disney's Epcot Center.

Mr. Charpie is an active soloist, often performing on antique brass instruments with bands and orchestras nationwide. He is also a published arranger of brass music, much of which has been recorded.

In the course of his career, he happened to see some Civil War re-enactment bands and discovered how much he enjoyed them. So, he decided to form his own historic ensemble, patterned after the brass bands that proliferated in California during the Gold Rush. That project led him to some Custer manuscripts and to the keyed bugle.

The more Charpie learned about the keyed bugle, the more he learned about one of its most talented and prolific practioners, Francis Johnson. Johnson was an early 19th-century African-American composer who enjoyed great renown in his day. He composed music for parades, dances, ceremonies and introduced promenades, the precursors to modern-day pops concerts. According to Charpie, Johnson was the first published African-American musician in the United States, the first documented musician to have an integrated band and the first American musician of any color to tour Europe.

Charpie has managed to piece together and revive the contributions of the once-forgotten composer. The result: a presentation about Johnson's life and music that is part concert, part slide show, part lecture. His "Francis Johnson" Toured in 11 states. The concert was featured as a half-hour PBS documentary in South Carolina.

Mr. Charpie produced, edited, and performed on a CD of the music of Felix Vinatieri, Custer's legendary bandmaster. This music was featured at the Great American Brass Band Festival and the National Civil War Brass Band Festival.

He is a nationally published author of articles related to historic brass, especially historic articles about Francis Johnson and Felix Vinatieri and was cited for work on the African-American musician, Francis Johnson, when he wrote an article for The International Dictionary of Black Composers, a nationally award winning book.

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

# **Quilt by Association**



One of the interesting aspects of the Band's fundraising projects is that it will do or sell practically anything (within reason and legal!) to earn those dollars that the Band requires every year to present its free concerts in Tower Grove and Francis Parks. This year we have a very special fundraiser - a handmade quilt designed and quilted by a very special 85- year old woman - Arlene Bilinski. Arlene is mother-in-law of Harry Swanger, founder and President of the Compton Heights

Band, and mother of Kitty Swanger. She moved to St. Louis from Bethlehem, Pennsylvania ten years ago and spends more time these days on quilting than she does on gardening.

Arlene has been quilting for a relatively short period of time, but during those years, she has specially designed a quilt for five of her seven great-grandchildren and also sews patchwork quilts with a group of women for St. Mark's Lutheran Church. The quilt for the benefit of the Band is the result of some "encouragement" from Harry, of course!

The center of the quilt (72" x 78") depicts the Henry Shaw Bandstand in Tower Grove Park. Dominant colors are green, gold and dark red, with several fabrics of a musical motif. A predominant pattern is known in the quilting circles as "sky rocket".

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
