The driving force behind the Compton Heights Concert Band is a preservationist philosophy determined to promote the American Concert Band, the unique American art form created by Patrick Gilmore in the 1860's and perfected by John Philip Sousa at the turn of the last century, and to play the fine concert band literature of yesteryear. As with jazz, another unique American art form, concert bands and concert band literature are undergoing a resurgence in America. Sousa's concerts were dubbed "the world's greatest pops concerts". In this tradition, a Compton Heights Concert Band concert features programming appealing to all ages and musical tastes; "something for everyone".

From its modest beginning in the Compton Heights neighborhood living room of band organizer, President and Executive Director, Harry F. Swanger, in 1976, the Band quickly became a metropolitan St. Louis area tradition, attracting over 50,000 listeners annually to its famed summer series, Sunday Serenades in Francis Park and the tandem series Musical Mondays in Tower Grove Park. Last year marked the 9th Annual highly successful Compton Heights Band Holiday Pops at Powell Hall. Performances in the past have included headliners such as Peter Nero, piano; Doc Severinsen, trumpet; and the perennial summer and Powell Hall crowd favorite, Hugh Smith, tenor. Other featured artists include: BBC Cardiff 2005 Singer of the World, Nicole Cabell; Arturo Sandoval, jazz/classical trumpet wizard; Sigrun Hjalmtysdottir, "Diddú", Soprano, David Morris, International Whistling Champion, Buckwheat Zydeko, Sukay, "Music of the Andes"; Alex Klein, Oboe; James Christensen, Walt Disney World; BNFL Brass Band; Butch Wax & The Hollywoods with Billy Peek; the late Johnnie Johnson; Jerry Robinson & Sax-O-Peel, The Lennon Brothers; the late William Warfield, Baritone; Debbye Turner, marimba; Ricardo Morales, Metropolitan Opera principal clarinet; the late Myron Floren, accordion; Keith Brion, Sousa portrayer; The Legend Singers; Robert Ellison, baritone; and Beverly Stewart-Anderson, soprano.

Edward Dolbashian, Music Director & Conductor, is the orchestra and opera conductor at the University of Missouri, Columbia, the Clayton Symphony, and the Alton Symphony Orchestra. He was appointed conductor of the Compton Heights Concert Band in September, 1998. He is a professional oboist and an English Horn player, originally from New York. **Lucy Schroeder**, announcer, is the wife of band vice-president and tubist **Jon Schroeder**, an original member of the Compton Heights Band!

In addition to weekly Band rehearsals, members devote thousands of volunteer hours at bingo at Bandwagon Hall on Friday and Saturday nights throughout the year. The Band is also financially supported by the Adam's Mark Hotel, Clifford Willard Gaylord Foundation, Foot and Ankle Associates, Missouri Arts Council, Regional Arts Commission, Southwest Bank, St. Louis Parks & Recreation Department, Tower Grove Manor, and Bandwagon Members.

We are buying the historic Immaculate Conception complex which will provide us with a terrific rehearsal and concert facility for performing arts groups, as well as the location of our office headquarters.

Support SousaMania 2007! A Special Message from the President.

An often asked question this summer by you, our faithful fans, has been "how are you doing?" This is a perplexing question to answer. On the one hand we have so many seemingly exciting projects in progress such as our renovation of the new headquarters and concert hall (former Immaculate Conception church), renova- tion of a former DeBasio Furniture Store for a state of the art bingo facility (best and biggest in Missouri), and the infusion of many new, young players; winners of the 1st annual Compton Heights Concert Band College Scholarship program, to name a few.

On the other hand, unavoidable expenses, such as replacement of aging equipment, crop up along with the expenses of growing and solidifying our organization *vis a vis* our new concert hall/headquarters and the new charity bingo facility. For example, in the first two weeks of our season, we have had to spend upwards of \$20,000 for sorely needed platforms, audio equipment, chairs, lighting, instruments, and other equipment for our rehearsal and concert stages. In addition to improve our bingo fundraising with the pending new facility, tens of thousands of dollars had to be spent in the short run on plans, permits, and early renovation. Extensive additional renovations and substantial long term financing will be necessary. Unlike the members of the Zoo-Museum District, we receive no large tax subsidies. Consequently, the Bandwagon memberships are not "extra" but "essential" funds for operating and supporting our growth considering the free Sunday Serenades and Musical Mondays series costs over \$300,000 to produce each year. Mary works in numerous ensembles throughout the St. Louis Metro area, including the St. Louis Symphony were she has been a Sub/Replacement/Extra since 1986, Principal Replacement/2nd Illinois Symphony 1993 – 2006, Principal and frequent soloist with the Compton Heights Concert Band, Opera Theater St. Louis, Union Avenue Opera, Bob Coleman Orchestra and formerly with the St. Louis Brass Band where she was a featured soloist on Eb Soprano and Bb Cornet on numerous occasions. Mary was Principal Trumpet in the New Orleans Symphony for two years. Her virtuosity and enthusiasm for music has provided her with far-ranging performances with such notables as Mannheim Steamroller, Luciano Pavarotti, Mel Torme, Ann Hampton-Callaway, The Temptations and Pope John Paul II! She has toured throughout the United States and Europe including Carnegie Hall with the St. Louis Symphony.

She attended the Tanglewood Institute as a Fellowship of Leonard Bernstein, the Spoleto Festival (U.S. and Spoleto, ,Italy), Classical Music Festival (Eisenstadt, Austria). She is actively engaged in recordings, competitions, recitals and lectures, and is the manager of the Clarion Brass. She holds a Bachelor of Music Performance from university of Miami (FL), a Bachelor of Sports Psychology from University of Miami, a Master of Music Performance from Syracuse University. She is Adjunct Professor at St. Louis University teaching Music Appreciation, Development of the Orchestra, Bio-Musicology, Symphonic Literature and Music Theory. Mary also taught Trumpet at SIU-E during the Spring 2006 for Dr. John Korak when he took Sabbatical. She has also been the Conductor of several ensembles including the Oasis New Horizon's Band when it began in St. Louis in 1999. Mary is a member of the International Trumpet Guild. Mary loves teaching private trumpet lessons with students ranging in age from 10 – 77!

Jason Harris, Trumpet/Flugel — Jason Harris is a graduate of the University of Missouri St. Louis, where he received his Bachelor in Music Education. He just graduated from Webster University (2007), where he received his Masters Music theory and Composition. Jason is an active musician, who has performed with the Opera Theater St. Louis, Union Avenue Opera theatre, St. Louis Philharmonic, Clarion Brass Quintet, Sessions big Band, LyriCo Opera Company, Webster Symphony, route 66, and the Bob Kuban Brass. He was also a featured soloist with the St. Louis Brass Band. Jason is a member of Who's Who among American Teachers, The International Association of Jazz Educator, the International Trumpet Guild, and the Missouri Music Educators Association. He was recently recognized by the Missouri Scholars Academy for his excellence in teaching.

John Thomas, French Horn — John is Principal Horn with the St. Luis Philharmonic Orchestra, a member of the Webster Symphony, and a freelance musician. He teaches French Horn, theory, and Composition at the Community Music School of Webster University and French Horn and Theory at St. Charles County Community College. In addition to these duties, he also has a thriving recording studio (Overland Studios) and records an eclectic mix of ensembles and groups throughout the St. Louis area.

David Hartung, Tuba — David hails from Frankfort, KY. He earned his undergraduate degree from the University of Kentucky in Lexington and his graduate degree from Webster University (2007). David has performed with the Louisville Orchestra, Keith Brion's New Sousa Band, Lexington Brass Band, St. Louis Philharmonic, Four Star Brass and the Guitar Circus. As a member of the Saxton's Cornet Band, David performed in the motion picture *Gettysburg*. He was also a founding member of the brass quintet, *Spectrum Brass*, which became an award-winning ensemble that toured the eastern United States. Since 1996, David has served his country as Principal Tubist with the United States Air Force Band of Mid-America at Scott Air Force Base, IL. Staff Sergeant Hartung has performed for four Presidents, pope John Paul II, the Japanese Prime Minister and the Secretary General of the United Nations. He has also performed on ABC's Good Morning America, CBS's Sunday Morning, NPR's All Things Considered and NBC's July 4th, 2004 Fireworks soundtrack with Ann Hampton Callaway and Michael Feinstein. David's teachers include Sam Pilafian, Patrick Sheridan, Jim Martin. Mike Sanders, Skip Gray, Earle Louder and Jerry Young.

Wm. Shane Williams, Percussion — Shane is a native of Tennessee where he began his professional music career as a percussionist at Opryland USA. He then graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in Music Education from Austin Peay State University which further lead him to continue his musical studies at the St. Louis Conservatory of Music under the tutelage of St. Louis Symphony Orchestra members John Kasica, Rick Holmes, and Tom Stubbs. During this time, he began performing as an extra with the SLSO.

As a professional musician, he has performed with the SLSO (noted performance: Carnegie Hall), Nashville Symphony, Illinois Symphony, Joffrey Ballet, Moody Blues, Joel Grey, Tommie Tune, Burt Bacharach, Roger Williams, Dionne Warwick, the Recorder Ensemble of the Paris Conservatoire, the Compton Heights Concert Band, the Gateway Chamber Orchestra and many others. As a percussion faculty, he teaches at the Masterworks Music Festival and Lindenwood University.

In 1999, Shane graduated with a second Masters of Music degree in Conducting from the University of Missouri-Columbia. Mr. Williams has guest conducted in Europe with the Zapadocesky Symphonic Orchestra of the Czech Republic and the United States with the Illinois Symphony, the Kirkwood Symphony, the Gateway Chamber Orchestra, the Compton Heights Concert Band, the St. Louis Brass Band, as well as MMEA and IMEA District Orchestras.

At this present time he serves on the conducting faculty at Lindenwood University as Music Director/Conductor of the Lindenwood Symphonic Orchestra. In addition, Maestro Williams currently holds the conducting posts of Pops Conductor with the Alton Symphony, Music Director/Conductor of the Young Peoples Concert Orchestra and Music Director/Conductor of the St. Charles County Youth Orchestra.

Mr. Williams can be seen performing music on TV station LU-26. He is a regular guest conductor, performer, clinician, and adjudicator within the region. Mr. Williams resides with his wife and sons in Wentzville.

Matt Frederickson hails from Springfield, Missouri and is a lifetime musician, teacher, and student. As a performer, Mr. Frederickson has studied trombone and euphonium with Roger Oyster, Nathaniel Brickens, and Bill Hartman, and has won many regional instrumental solo competitions including the 1996 MTNA Missouri brass artist contest. Mr. Frederickson serves as principal trombone with the St. Louis Philharmonic Orchestra and has toured with the Air Force Bands spanning five continents. He has performed on television and radio and recorded with professional symphonies and bands, such as the Missouri Chamber Orchestra and Symphony Pops, Springfield Symphony, Springfield Regional Opera, Ft. Smith Symphony, Jimmy Dorsey Big Band, Little Rock Wind Symphony, Solid Brass and the St. Louis Brass Band.

Most recently, he has performed with the United States Academy Band's Galaxy Brass and the Air Force Band of Mid America's Shades of Blue jazz ensemble. Mr. Frederickson has performed with such artists as Frank Mantooth, Bobby Shew, John Pizzarelli, Clark Terry, Eddie Daniels, Si Zentner, Eric Rusk, Nester Torres, Roger Ingram, and many others. Presently, he is an instrumental music teacher for the Rockwood school district, as well as the adjunct professor of Low Brass for Lindenwood University and St. Charles Community College. His former students have recognized him on multiple occasions with Who's Who Among America's Teachers. Just this year, Missouri State University is honoring him as Outstanding Alumnus. He serves as a guest clinician all over the country and is a regular adjudicator for MTNA, Music in the Parks, and for various local marching, concert and jazz festivals across the Midwest.

As a professional educator, Mr. Frederickson belongs to Phi Beta Mu International School Bandmaster Fraternity, Kappa Delta Pi International Honor Society in Education, Hugh O'Brian Youth Leadership Foundation and the International Trombone Association, and is an honorary member of Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia. He has served as adjunct instructor for the St. Louis Symphony Community Music School and East Central Community College. Mr. Frederickson has served as a public school band director for Gasconade County, Union and Rockwood Schools. He served as a visiting professor of Low Brass for the Jones School of Fine Arts at Ouachita University in Arkadelphia, AR and is now the adjunct professor of low brass for Lindenwood University and St. Charles Community College. He resides in Wildwood, MO where he lives with his wife Alison and three children, Laura, Nathaniel, and Joel.

Edward Dolbashian, Music Director/Conductor



Edward Dolbashian has been Music Director of the Missouri University Philharmonic in Columbia, Missouri, since 1984; Music Director of the Alton Symphony Orchestra, in Alton, Illinois, since 1993; and the Compton Heights Concert Band since September 1998. He is also the conductor of the Clayton Symphony.

Mr. Dolbashian began his musical training as a student at New York's famed High School of the Performing Arts. He earned his degrees in oboe performance at the Hartt College of Music, Hartford, CT.

His conducting career began as director of the Holyoke Symphony Orchestra in Holyoke, MA. He studied conducting at the prestigious Pierre Monteaux School of Orchestra Conducting in Maine, under Charles Bruck:

and at Yale University as student conducting assistant to Otto Werner-Mueller leading to a Master of Musical Arts degree in Orchestral Conducting. Further studies took place at the Tanglewood Institute, with Leonard Bernstein, Seiji Ozawa, Andre Previn, and Gustav Meier, and the Boris Goldovsky Opera Conducting Seminar.

Mr. Dolbashian was a member of the Hartford Symphony for 11 years and was principal oboe of the Hartford Chamber Orchestra, the Goldovsky Opera Company, and the Hudson Valley Philharmonic. He debuted as oboe soloist in Town Hall, NY, NY, 1969.


