
### WAIT TILL THE SUN SHINES, NELLIE

## THE ORGANIZATION

The Compton Heights Concert Band of St. Louis was organized in 1976. Initially, the Band performed at Compton Heights Neighborhood events such as the Easter, July 4th and Christmas celebrations. The Band's membership numbered 18 at its first performance. Growing rapidly in size and experience, the Band made its first major public appearance in August, 1977, in the Tower Grove Park Concert Series held in the Shaw Memorial Bandstand. Presently, the Band consists of sixty-seven members who represent some of the leading amateur, student and professional musicians from the St. Louis Metropolitan Area. The Band continues to be St. Louis' only community concert band and includes in its membership lawyers, doctors, teachers, journalists, nurses, retailers, small business owners, printers, government workers, computer specialists, a judge and other miscellaneous occupations.

The Band director, Kaid Friedel, is a Compton Heights resident and member of the St. Louis Symphony horn section. He has directed the Band from its inception. Mr. Friedel brings to the Band a long professional conducting career including the Alton Civic Orchestra, Kansas City Legion Band and Kansas City Youth Symphony.

Last year the Band presented its second "TUNE-FULL TUESDAYS" series which over the course of seven concerts attracted more than 14,000 listeners to the Henry Shaw Memorial Bandstand in Tower Grove Park. In 1981 the Band and the "TUNE-FULL TUESDAYS" series were honored by the receipt of a City of St. Louis proclamation issued by Mayor Schoemehl declaring one of the series nights as "TUNE-FULL TUESDAY" in St. Louis.

The Band has also been recognized by the Selmer Band Instrument Company, Elkhart, Indiana, as a model for community concert bands throughout the nation. Many of the Band's organizational techniques, promotional ideas and fundraising approaches were incorporated by Selmer in a nationally distributed publication, designed to guide and spur the development of community concert bands in other cities.

A record eight concerts featured soloists and sing-a-longs for the first time, highlight the 1982 "TUNE-FULL TUESDAYS" series. Other firsts this summer include the Band's appearances in Forest Park in a three concert, Sunday afternoon series in the restored Nathan Frank Memorial Bandstand sponsored by Target Stores and the Band. In addition, the Band will present four concerts for the City Parks, Recreation and Forestry Department in the Willmore, Gravois, Carondolet and Soulard City Parks. The season will close with a Pantheon Corporation sponsored concert in the DeBalivier Development Area. As usual, the Band will appear at neighborhood celebrations and benefits and present its 7th Annual Children's Christmas Concert.

To finance the many expenses connected with a musical organization size and scope of the Compton Heights Concert Band the Band depends on individual donations, concert sponsors'fees, corporate donations, sales of Band T-Shirts and buttons, antique Compton Heights poster reproductions, an annual Flea Market (September 26, 1982), subscriptions to the Old House Journal, grants from the St. Louis Arts and Humanities Commission, the Missouri Arts Council, and BAND-WAGON memberships. The BANDWAGON IS THE CITIZENS SUPPORT ORGANIZATION FOR THE Band and a vehicle for active involvement with the Band. (See details and application in this program.)
